Weltpolitik and the Navy Laws

6. Questions I

History is all about answering questions. Every sentence in your textbooks comes from historians wanting to understand what was going on, asking questions of the sources, and – sometimes amidst a great deal of contention – coming up with suggested answers.

The basic question types are:

What? - eg: "Describe two problems faced by Germany before 1914."

Why? – eg: "Explain why the Kaiser wanted to expand the Germany Navy."

How? - eg: "In what ways were the lives of the people of Kiaochow affected by Wilhelm's policies?"

Consequences? - eg: "Explain two consequences of Kaiser Wilhelm's entry into Jerusalem."

Comparison? – eg: "Which of the following was the more important reason Kaiser Wilhelm's foreign policy caused alarm:

- the Navy Laws
- his Weltpolitik?

Discussion? – eg: "The One-man Orchestra of the European Concert'. How far do you agree with this French view of Kaiser Wilhelm?"

Using only the information on the webpage, invent 2 questions for each of the following question-styles:
a. Describe two problems faced by
b. In what ways were the lives of affected by
c. Which of the following was the more important reason for:
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
